

INSPIRING LEARNING

'Inspiring Learning' started life on a shortlist of school mottos on my first outing as Headteacher, shortly after my appointment in June 2015. Governors had organised a meeting with the local community to update them on progress with their new project, and wanted me to come along. I had no idea what they had in mind, how many people would attend, or what was expected. But first impressions are important ones, and I wanted to make sure that this meeting would demonstrate what the community should expect from Pinner High School.

People just kept coming and coming through the school gates, until over two hundred of them sat expectantly in the school hall. As an unoccupied building at the time, to be so suddenly full of life seemed as unfamiliar to the space as being introduced as the Headteacher of Pinner High School did to me. We both wear it more comfortably now. It was immediately clear how much support there was- and is- for the school, and the inclusive ethos Governors were so keen on. I wanted to bring that inclusion to life at the meeting, and did so by asking those assembled to vote for the school motto. Perhaps not the most important decision made before the school opened, but one that resonates through all that we do. The voting is a tangible statement of how the school involves the community. 'Inspiring Learning' was the clear winner. As an English teacher, the double meaning always appealed to me: students should expect inspiring lessons, but they should see it as a responsibility to inspire learning in others too.

And now? As the first year in the life of Pinner High School reaches a crescendo (I nearly said 'as the school year draws to a close' but that sounds far too passive, at Pinner High it just builds and builds) 'Inspiring Learning' is a great deal more than a line written into our school vision statement. Students and staff bring 'Inspiring Learning' to life in their everyday interactions. It is visible in the way students say they enjoy their lessons, the care and excitement with which teachers plan them, and the dedication with which support staff go above and beyond behind the scenes. Setting fire to methane bubbles in your hands at lunchtime during Science week is one of the more practical ways of showing what 'Inspiring Learning' has come to mean. So are the opportunities available to students outside the classroom; whole year group visits to Hillingdon Outdoor Activity centre, the Science Museum's Wonder Lab, Shakespeare's Globe and the British Library. Not many places can take the whole school on a trip, and doing so four times over only proves this point.

And what of other sources of inspiration? A very well qualified staff, and a comprehensive approach to professional development. Support in that professional development from the Harrow Academies Trust, the Harrow Collegiate Teaching School Alliance, the Cannons Park Alliance, Governors, the Harrow School Improvement Partnership, the Princes Teaching Institute. School leaders also contribute to these programmes, and I have enjoyed speaking about the school in presentations at two national conferences, at the Excel arena in London and the NEC in Birmingham. Inspiring Learning covers all members of our community.


And so back to the community who blew the cobwebs away from the school hall back in June 2015. Now, they have been augmented by two thousand people a week reading the school blog. Reading how in the same school hall this term students heard about opportunities to visit Spain, China and Costa Rica on school visits over the next two years. They hear how an overwhelming number of our students are on track to meet or exceed their very ambitious end of year targets in each subject, well above national and local benchmarks. All this brings life to 'Inspiring Learning' in ways I could have only hoped two years ago. Whilst end of Year 7 targets are useful milestones, the remainder of the school vision statement that follows 'Inspiring Learning' brings our future challenges sharply into focus: "We will equip our students with an understanding of themselves, an appreciation of the world around them and a desire to innovate and solve problems as active contributors to society." This part of the statement is still in the future tense. It probably always will be.



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




TRAILBLAZING

READING AT PINNER HIGH SCHOOL



Academic studies continue to show that reading is one of the single most important factors in a young person's development. Ofsted comment, in a document unlikely to make it into many holiday reading lists, that 'there is a growing body of evidence which illustrates the importance of reading for pleasure for both educational purposes as well as personal development' (cited in Clark and Rumblod 2006). Pinner High School's translation: 'not only is it good for you, it is also fun'. With a Headteacher who is also an English teacher (who teaches the whole of Year 7 by teaching each Year 7 class for half a term) and a passionate Head of English in Mr. Allaway, it is no surprise that reading has already been noted as a strength of the school by visiting inspectors.



"Reading at Pinner High School started before we even joined the school. When we had induction day, we all got given a book to read over the summer. When we came back, in English we were studying the book. This was really good as all of us were at the same point by reading 'Wonder' by RJ Palacio (the book we were reading) over the summer. Having read the book, we then discussed the themes, characters and ideas. There was a lot of benefits to this because all of us knew what the book was and what happened in it. 'Wonder' is about someone who was starting secondary school, and the particular difficulties he had to overcome. Therefore, it was a good book to start off with in our first half term unit on trailblazers in literature" notes Khushal in 7AX. "The next text we looked at was by Malala Yousafzai, who we named one of our Houses after, so that was good too."

Deanna in 7AX says "There are many opportunities to take part in many reading activities at Pinner High such as reading club and the reading challenge. Reading club is a club held by Mr Allaway where you can talk about books and vote for which book is the best. The reading challenge is a challenge open to all students at Pinner High and you have to read a list of books and write reviews in order to earn house points."

"Carnegie Club has been a good opportunity to share my opinions of certain books and discuss whether we agree with the conclusions of top class book reviewers. The Carnegie Medal is a national prize given to the writer of the best children's book of the year, as decided by a judging panel.

We shadow this panel and decide what we think of all the books. Also I have learnt a lot from these books as they are specifically catered to children, so as you would expect these books play out many scenarios and expand my vocabulary. I was surprised at how much fun it was, the books are kids books so there are many jokes to be made. Half of the time I leave having cried from laughter! It also opened many opportunities for kids like me. On the announcement day of the winner, there is an event where many readers like myself come together to discuss our opinions and expand our horizons. My favourite part of this club was reviewing the books with my friends joking about them but still making our opinions clear," says Alex in 7BY.

Nathan in 7MY says "Some students in the reading group had the chance to see a performance adapted from 'Refugee Boy' the novel by Benjamin Zephania, at the Chicken Shed Theatre. I thought it was great as it is a genre I am not familiar with which intrigued me even more. I liked how the actor who played Alem knew Ethiopia which added to the authenticity. I didn't like some of the changes they made from the book- books are better!"



HEAD ON ONE YEAR INTO THE HEAD'S CHALLENGE

The Head's Challenge unites the school's House Events, twice weekly Clubs, outdoor adventures and charity work. It is a programme of personal challenge that encourages each student to push themselves to explore new activities and broaden their horizons. It is a way for students to exhibit the Pinner High School Values, and bring 'Inspiring Learning' to life in and out of the classroom. Students have embraced the Head's Challenge to such an extent that higher levels of awards have been added during the year, and every single student is on track to complete at least the Pearl Award by the end of the academic year.

So why has this been such a success? A great deal of enthusiasm was generated during the first school trip to the Hillingdon Outdoor Activity Centre, which every child took part in back in September and this momentum has continued all year. The inclusive school ethos is such that every child is expected to take part, and all rise to this challenge and support each other in the process. However, the greatest factor in the success of the Head's Challenge is the range of Clubs on offer to the students every week. Many schools offer after school activities; few insist on every student taking part in two different ones every week.

In the first half of the summer term, 18 different clubs were available every week. This range of activities was recognised in a Pearson Teaching Award Certificate of Excellence for the Clubs Leaders in the Outstanding School Team of the Year category. As this is a national prize open to over 5,000 schools, this is a brilliant achievement which gets to the heart of the school: dedicated teachers putting on high quality learning opportunities for all students, week in week out. The students frequently talk about how much they enjoy these activities when meeting with governors and feeding back about the school. The Head's Challenge also provides a vehicle for students to make a charitable contribution. This year funds have been raised for Jeans for Genes Day, the Poppy Appeal, Children in Need, Comic Relief and Great Ormond Street Hospital. As the school grows and the students get older, they will be able to volunteer their time as well as give money and so further develop the scope of this aspect of the Head's Challenge.

As this is the 80th anniversary of the first opening of Pinner County School, the event was especially well attended this year. Pinner High is very grateful to the Association for donating the House Cup to the school, to bring together those who attended the school from 1937-1982. As all students at Pinner High will compete for the Cup, and a third of them will win it every year, this is a very fitting award that celebrates the past, present and future of the school.





Pinner High School has invited a range of Primary schools to visit this year, for a range of activities. Cannon Lane and West Lodge have enjoyed the high quality Science provision from our specialist teachers, while Reddiford and St. John Fisher joined them to compete for the inaugural Maths Challenge for Year 5 students. Homework

Homework Club provides an alternative to the image of children working alone, as if in a library, completing homework set by their subject teachers.

Homework Club is about much more than this. It is a unique version of 'Inspiring Learning' that explores the links between subjects, through project based learning. This allows students to see how their subjects link together, and can be greater than the sum of the individual parts. It is a more independent approach to learning, which allows topics to be chosen that enforce research skills, and encourage more sustained exploration of a child's own interests. Einstein said "Any fool can know. The point is to understand." By looking beyond the body of knowledge that a student is expected to acquire during their lessons, we can see what it shows us about the world around us. Lincoln talked about the 'links in the chain stretching from the finite to the infinite'. Homework Club allows students to explore the links across subjects, to create, imagine and inspire. Ms Smyth, Assistant Headteacher, notes how "Homework Club allows students to learn and practice valuable skills such as teamwork, creativity, problem solving which are needed for the new world of work."

Students have a large variety of topics during Homework Club, that enable them to look at what is going on in the world and apply their studies to it. As a compulsory part of the school day, Tuesday's lesson 7, every student has the opportunity to engage with this approach to learning. Head of English Mr. Allaway says "Homework Club equips students with the skills and independence they need to thrive across the curriculum."
