

British Values Statement

March 2022

The Department for Education have reinforced the "need to create and enforce a clear rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British Values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

At Pinner High School these values are reinforced regularly alongside the Pinner High School Values in the follow ways:

Democracy

'An understanding of how citizens can influence decision-making through the democratic process'

Democracy is evident within Pinner High School. We have three houses: Bannister, Malala and Ali. These Houses were named by the students through an election: Bannister won the most votes from 'Inspiring Local People', Malala won the most votes from 'Inspiring Women', and Mohammed Ali won the most votes from 'Inspiring Diversity'. Students also voted for the House colours. Students did this on Induction Day in July 2016 – thus, Student Democracy was evident before the school opened on 1st September 2016.

Each of these Houses has two elected House Captains within each year group. All applicants for House Captains must write a statement of application, success in this will lead to an interview panel (made up of staff). Successful candidates from the interview present their campaign speeches to all of the students in their Houses during House assemblies. All of the young children are invited to take part in a democratic ballot where they select who they would like to represent them. There was a whole school vote for our Head Students, now that the Trailblazers have reached Year 12.

Students have the opportunity to have their voice heard during meetings lead by form representatives, which will be presented to the leadership team termly. In addition, students will take part in surveys as part of the feedback system, as they did in response to the 'Everyone's Invited' survey in summer 2021 Creating these opportunities for students allow them to contribute towards the vision of the school in a democratic way.

Student leadership is a key element for the development of Pinner High school students. During their time at Pinner High they will assume many different leadership roles when guiding peers and making decisions. Students can be members of the Student Government, Charity Group, Travel Advisors, Sports Captains.

Pinner High School 'encourages respect for democracy and support for participation in the democratic processes, including respect for the basis on which the law is made and applied in England'. Students are given the opportunity to examine different democratic processes through the curriculum and develop a voice of their own. For instance, democracy at student level, where students elect their own house captains. Democracy at a school level where the student panel is used to reflect on teaching and learning throughout Pinner High School. Students participate in the appointment of senior school staff through student panels as well.



The Rule of Law

'An appreciation that living under rule of law protects individual citizens and is essential for their wellbeing and safety'

Students of Pinner High School are taught from an early age the rules of the school including the behaviour policy, anti-bullying policy, playground rules and rules about keeping them safe. Students are taught the reason behind rules and laws and the responsibilities and consequences when laws are broken. Students are encouraged to reflect on their individual choices and continuously represent the Pinner High School Values around the school and local community.

Pinner High School 'encourages students to accept responsibility for their behaviour, show initiative, and to understand how they can contribute positively to the lives of those living and working in the locality of the school and to society more widely'. Students work closely with the local community to build relationships, including places of worship. Through PRE and charity programmes students will promote kindness and compassion around the community. Instead of tickets for the Spring concert, audience members were asked to bring a donation for the local food bank.

Individual Liberty

'An understanding that the freedom to choose and hold other faiths and beliefs is protected in law'

At Pinner High School, students are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. Students are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and advise how to exercise these safely, for example through PSCHE and e-safety sessions. Students are given the freedom to make choices of preference for their enrichment activities. Pinner High School offers a variety of study of different faiths and cultures through the PRE curriculum. The school's Stonewall school champion status shows the commitment to supporting a range of beliefs.

Mutual Respect

'An acceptance that other people having different faiths or beliefs to oneself (or having none) should be accepted and tolerated, and should not be the cause of prejudicial or discriminatory behaviour'

Our school reinforces mutual respect through the form of assemblies and Personal, Social and Health Education ('PSHCE') lessons. Students are encouraged to listen to one another. We celebrate our diverse community through events such as Black History Month, and working with a school in Taiwan in our Mandarin programme. The school achieved the EQ Award in the summer of 2017, recognising the commitment to Equality throughout the school.

Tolerance of those of Different Faiths and Beliefs

'An understanding of the importance of identifying and combatting discrimination'

Pinner High School is a multicultural school serving a diverse local community. The PRE curriculum promotes students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. Assemblies, Philosophy Religious educations and PSCHE lessons, as well as special events, reinforce



messages of tolerance and respect for others. Children are taught this form of respect when visiting different places of worship.

Pinner High School Values

The ethos for Pinner High School will be a school that is characterised by:

- expecting the highest standards from students and staff;
- a calm, friendly, and disciplined environment with positive relationships;
- a curriculum that excites and stretches all students;
- knowing every student and supporting their personal development;
- working in partnership with families and the wider community;

- preparing students to have the skills and knowledge required to progress successfully from school.

Students of Pinner High School are expected to build trust and integrity with their peers and staff.

Students of Pinner High School are encouraged to be dedicated to their interests and passion along with being flexible in their abilities and with one another. Pinner High School promotes creativity through different House competition along with their student leadership team. Staff at Pinner High School supports their students to persevere and become resilient individuals promoting the ethos of the school.



My community

Students of Pinner High School take responsibility for their education and the development of the school. Pinner High school 'enables students to develop their self-knowledge, self-esteem and self-confidence' through the different opportunities provided working with the community. Students have the courage to collaborate with the community to fund raise, to have an open-mindedness of needs of others. Students of Pinner High School work with feeder schools to demonstrate leadership skills along with supporting younger students. They adapt their skills and knowledge when collaborating on projects with the community.
